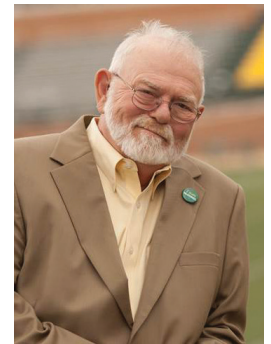

ALUMNUS OF THE YEAR:

DR. DONALD J. HOBART '62

Don's commitment to community service, his professional achievements and unrelenting service to McDaniel College have earned him the 2016 Alumni Association Alumnus of the Year award. Don has been featured in *Maryland People*; has been named an Outstanding Teacher, Department of Physical Therapy; has had an endowed scholarship, the "Donald J. Hobart Scholarship Fund," established in his name by the University of Maryland at Baltimore (UMAB) Physical Therapy Alumni Association and has also received the Distinguished Service Award from the Maryland Chapter of the American Physical Therapy Association (APTA).



As a student, Don was an Alpha Gamma Tau Bachelor and a football player. After receiving his Bachelors of Science in Physical Education in 1962, Don served his country as a 1st Lieutenant, 1st Battalion 35th Infantry, 25th Division at the Schofield Barracks in Hawaii for three years. Upon his return, Don continued his education to receive a Masters of Arts in 1967 and Doctorate of Philosophy in 1972 in Physical Education from the University of Maryland. His career as a professor began at the Baltimore College of Dental Surgery, Dental School of University of Maryland, and he then became a tenured associate professor in the Department of Physical Therapy and Rehabilitation Science at the University of Maryland, School of Medicine. Following retirement from the University of Maryland, Don continued to pursue his passions in photography and woodworking. After 10 years, he rejoined academia serving as Associate Coordinator of the Transitional Doctorate of Physical Therapy programs at both the University of Montana and University of South Florida.

Don's community service includes a wide spectrum of both professional and local service. He has chaired various research sections of international congresses of the International Society of Electrophysiology and Kinesiology (ISEK) in Pavia, Italy, Boston and Tokyo, and he served as Secretary General for the international congress of ISEK in Baltimore.

Don is currently a member of the Board of Governors for the American Congress of Electroneuromyography. He has been a Boy Scout Assistant Troop Scout Master and a Girl Scout Troop Scout Master. In addition, he served on the YMCA Board of Directors in Carroll County. Don has served on his WMC/McDaniel class reunion committee for more than 30 years; as the McDaniel College Alumni Association President Elect, President and Past President; as a Visiting Trustee on the McDaniel College Board of Trustees and initiated the Presidential Task Force. He serves on the WMC Heritage Society of the Alumni Council and has produced reunion videos for the Classes of 1962 and 1963.

Don has written and published several books including *A Dissector of Human Anatomy*, and has co-authored or contributed to several more. Don has also written many journal articles, had research abstracts published in proceedings. Don has furthered his research as the principal investigator in many grant funded projects.

ALUMNI ASSOCIATION COLLEGE SERVICE AWARD RECIPIENTS

LTG(R) Otto Guenther '63

LTG(R) Otto Guenther considers service in all walks of life to be one of the most important things anyone can accomplish during their human lifetime. Lieutenant General Guenther dedicated 34 years and received numerous medals before his retirement from the Army and remains the highest-ranking military officer ever to graduate from McDaniel. Otto continues to serve others in civilian leadership positions including serving many roles at McDaniel College. A member of McDaniel's Board of Trustees, Otto is currently serving as chair of the Institutional Advancement Committee, and sits on the Building and Grounds and the Enrollment Management and Marketing Committees. He is active in his class reunion planning and as a Mentor for McDaniel's ROTC Program. He co-chaired the Carpe Diem campaign, chaired Presidential Task Force committees, and is an active member of the WMC Heritage Society, which is a part of the Alumni Council. Currently, Otto is also serving on the committee to plan the College's 150th Anniversary, which will be held during the 2017-2018 academic year.

Otto continues to be a leader in supporting the less fortunate at Lorton Community Action Center and serves the homeless at Rising Hope Mission Church. Otto has served as a mentor for young men on the path to college, with one now a McDaniel graduate. Otto also serves on the Board of Directors for Widepoint Corporation and SNVC Corporation. In 2013, Otto was awarded McDaniel's Alumni Community Service Award.

McDaniel College was instrumental in providing Otto the education to mold his character and encourage him to act and lead with a servant's heart. Otto's plan for the future is to continue to serve others as long as he is capable in whatever capacity is needed.

Mr. Donald Rembert '61

Don's devotion to McDaniel is reflected in his long list of college service endeavors. In 2006, Don founded and chairs the WMC Heritage Society, a committee that preserves the legacy of Western Maryland College while focusing on the future as McDaniel College. He serves on the Stadium Project Committee and continues to rally support towards various fundraising efforts. Don has served on the Board of Trustees since 2007 in various roles including the Budget and Finance, Enrollment Management and Marketing, Executive, and Institutional Advancement Committees. He is president of the Class of 1961, was President of the Student Government 1960-61, and serves on his reunion committee. Don was a contributing member of the Presidential Task Force, active member of the Pacesetter Committee for the Carpe Diem campaign and chair of the Founders Society for the Annual Fund. He remains a leader in student recruitment and retention. A fellow alum states that Don "remains one of the most active cheerleaders of the college." Don and his wife Judy '60, along with other dedicated alumni, renovated the oldest house on campus at 205 Pennsylvania Ave. in 2011. The house, renamed Rembert House in their honor, features the Seidel Conference Room that serves as the home base to the WMC Heritage Society, and a patio for college functions.

Don is the President of Rembert Pendleton Jackson and has worked as a financial advisor since 1974. He is an active member of the Investment Adviser Association, the Southern Economics Association, the Ludwig Von Mises Institute and Northern Virginia Board of Realtors. Don specializes in global investment asset allocation, retirement and estate planning and small business consulting.

All three of Don's children attended Western Maryland College. The legacy lives on!

ALUMNI ASSOCIATION COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD RECIPIENTS

Mr. Kenneth Gill '61

In 2012, McDaniel College dedicated the new Kenneth R. Gill stadium in honor of the trustee and member of the Class of 1961 who played football on the same field. An avid supporter of the project, Ken chaired the Stadium Project Committee and coordinated alumni funding in excess of \$8.5 million towards the new stadium. As another token of gratitude for a life-changing experience, Ken has supported the Anne Arundel Medical Center, which he credits for saving his life after he was treated for prostate cancer, establishing the Prostate Navigator Program. The medical center named their new building, which connects the two hospital campuses, the Gill Gateway.

Ken graduated from McDaniel as a commissioned second lieutenant and was called to serve in the 101st Airborne Division during the Cuban Missile Crisis. Following his service in the military, Ken and former college roommates opened several restaurants. This began a series of entrepreneurial opportunities leading Ken to founding The Gill Company, which is comprised of Gill Marketing and Gill Manufacturing. Ken has served on numerous boards including the National Food Rescue, Foodservice

Equipment Distributing Association (FEDA) Educational Foundation, Anne Arundel Medical Center and the Arizona Biltmore Golf Club. He founded and chaired the George W. Yu Foundation for Nutrition & Health.

Ken has served on McDaniel's Board of Trustees in many capacities including the Building and Grounds, Enrollment Management and Marketing, Student Affairs, and Institutional Advancement Committees. Ken has a scholarship fund in his and his wife Joanne's name and created the Ken Gill Fund for Enterprise Economics.

The FEDA has honored Ken with the Lifetime Achievement Award and recently named into Foodservice Equipment and Supplies Magazine's 2015 Hall of Fame. Ken was also inducted into the McDaniel College Green Terror Sports Hall of Fame in 2012.

Mr. Neal Hoffman '65

Neal began his community service efforts back in the 70's as a chairman and board member of the Carroll County YMCA. Since then, Neal has always volunteered in the community. He has been a trustee for Davis Library, Inc. since 1994 and served as the president for more than 10 years. He was a trustee for the Carroll Hospital Center Foundation for ten years, a director of the Carroll County Bank & Trust for five years, and chairman of the Carroll County Advisory Board of Directors of Branch Banking and Trust Company for 13 years. He has also served on a committee for the Carroll County Student Grant Program. Neal volunteered as a coach and manager for Westminster Little League, manager for the Westminster Babe Ruth League and has been treasurer of the Carroll County Old Timers Baseball Association for 15 years. He is a member and was past president of the Carroll County Bar Association. Neal was a trustee at Carroll Lutheran Village where he served two six-year terms on the Finance Committee, chaired the Governance Committee and currently is a member of the Human Resources Committee.

Here at McDaniel, Neal served as a committee member for the Carpe Diem campaign and the National Alumni Fund, Nominating Committee of the Alumni Council and the Regional Chapter Steering Committee. He has also volunteered on the Physical Dimension Campaign, and for the annual phonathon.

Neal received his Juris Doctor at the University of Baltimore School of Law and is the managing partner at Hoffman, Comfort, Offutt, Scott & Halstad LLP.

Mr. Larry Schmidt '75

Larry's crowning volunteer achievement is his time spent serving on the Board of Education in Baltimore County after being appointed by former Governor Martin O'Malley. He served on the Board for six years, three as President. Baltimore County is the sixth largest school system in the United States, with 110,000 students and a \$1.5 billion budget. He compares serving on the organization's board to being the Chairman of the Board at a Fortune 500 company.

Larry serves on the Board of Directors for the Greater Towson Committee, which fosters business opportunities and redevelopment in the Towson area. He has also volunteered

his time for nearly 20 years at the Lutherville Timonium Recreation Council and was the President of the girls' softball program. Additionally, Larry is on the Board of Directors for the Genesee Valley Outdoor Learning Center, which provides learning opportunities and team building skills to children and adults. He has been a volunteer attorney for more than 20 years for the Maryland State Mock Trial program, which engages students of both public and private schools to mimic real scenarios of court proceedings. Larry is very proud of the fact that his daughter was involved in the mock trial program and is now a practicing attorney.

Professionally, Larry is a partner at Smith, Gildea & Schmidt, LLC law firm in Towson. Following McDaniel, Larry received his Juris Doctor from University of Baltimore. He is a member of the Maryland State Bar Association and Baltimore County Bar Association. He was awarded the 2016 Leadership Law Award by *The Daily Record* and was on the State Board of Governors for the Maryland Bar.

ALUMNI ASSOCIATION PROFESSIONAL ACHIEVEMENT AWARD RECIPIENTS

Dr. Jennifer Leigh Disney '93

Dr. Jennifer Leigh Disney is Professor and Chair of the Department of Political Science and Director of the Women's and Gender Studies Program at Winthrop University in Rock Hill, South Carolina. Following her graduation from McDaniel, Jennifer went directly into the Ph.D. Program in Political Science at The Graduate School and University Center of the City University of New York (CUNY), completing her Masters of Arts and Masters of Philosophy degrees, a Certificate in Women's Studies, and earning her Ph.D. with distinction.

Jennifer authored the book *Women's Activism and Feminist Agency in Mozambique and Nicaragua*. She has also authored and co-authored several articles, including "Militarism and Its Discontents: Neoliberalism, Repression, and Resistance in Twenty-First-Century US-Latin American Relations." She is the co-editor of *New Political Science: A Journal of Politics and Culture*, the official, quarterly, peer reviewed journal of the New Political Science Section of the American Political Science Association (APSA) and the Caucus for a New Political Science (CNPS). Jennifer has served as the Founding Director for the Office of Nationally Competitive Awards (ONCA) at Winthrop University. She has written countless conference papers and presentations and has served on many professional panels all over the country.

She has received numerous awards in her professional career including the Christian Bay Best Paper and Women and Politics Best Dissertation Awards by the APSA and the Carolyn Heilbrun Women's Studies Dissertation Award from The Graduate School and University Center of C.U.N.Y. Jennifer has also received several Winthrop University awards including a Presidential Citation for hosting the Southeastern Women's Studies Association (SEWSA) 40th Anniversary Conference and the DiGiorgio Student Union "Make the World a Better Place Award."

Dr. Sam Hopkins '80

Dr. Sam Hopkins has over 30 years of experience in the pharmaceutical industry. He has held managerial, scientific, and executive leadership positions at the Wellcome Research Laboratories, Trimeris Inc., Parion Sciences, and Scynexis Inc. Currently he is the acting president of Valanbio Therapeutics and directs the clinical research program for Autoimmune Technologies. Sam also provides independent consulting services in drug discovery and development through IOTEC Pharma Consulting LLC.

Throughout his career Sam participated in multiple aspects of anti-viral drug research including discovery, non-clinical development, and all phases of clinical evaluation. At Trimeris Inc., Sam was responsible for designing and implementing the clinical/regulatory strategy that led to the global approval of Fuzeon® (enfuvirtide) for the treatment of HIV-1 infection. In 2003 the U.S. Food and Drug Administration recognized the approval of Fuzeon® as a major milestone in HIV-1 drug development. Sam has been a regular presenter at major national and international scientific conferences and has co-authored over 100 abstracts, patents, and peer-reviewed journal articles. This includes his landmark 1998 publication in Nature Medicine, which has been referenced in peer-reviewed scientific literature over 1,000 times, establishing the HIV-1 gp41 transmembrane protein as a valid target for antiviral chemotherapeutic drug discovery and development.

Sam has participated in private as well as public financings and has raised over \$400 million for start-up companies from venture capital sources, National Institutes of Health (NIH) grants and contracts, private equity, corporate partnerships, and public equity markets. During his tenure with Trimeris Inc., Sam played an active role in licensing the fusion inhibitor technology platform to Hoffman LaRoche ultimately building the market capitalization of Trimeris Inc., to over \$4 billion.

After receiving his degree from McDaniel College, he received his Ph.D. in biochemistry and biophysics at the Medical College of Virginia in Richmond, Va. He completed his post-doctoral training at the Wellcome Research Laboratories in Research Triangle Park, North Carolina. Sam's oldest daughter is a freshman at McDaniel and he has really enjoyed returning to campus.

Dr. Joseph McDade '62

Dr. Joseph McDade graduated from McDaniel with a B.S. in Biology, then continued his education to receive a Ph.D. in microbiology from the University of Delaware. Joe began his professional career as an Army officer assigned to the U.S. Army Biological Labs at Ft. Detrick, Md. He later worked as a research associate at the University of Maryland School of Medicine, assigned to Egypt and Ethiopia to study epidemic and murine typhus.

Joe joined the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), which marked the beginning of a long and very productive career in public health that continues to present day. He quickly gained international recognition by isolating the causative

agent of Legionnaires' disease, and in collaboration with others, identifying its mode of transmission and establishing treatment regimens. Later, Joe identified the first case of human ehrlichiosis, a previously undiagnosed tick-borne infectious disease. He assumed the role of Deputy Director of the National Center for Infectious Diseases (NCID). Responsible for the oversight of all NCID laboratory activities, he became the CDC's liaison to many public health partners, both inside and outside government, and was frequently invited to speak at national and international conferences.

After he retired from the CDC, he worked at Berry College as a scientist-in-residence, part-time instructor and faculty advisor for students aspiring to careers in medicine or in allied health fields. Joe currently is a member of the National Science Advisory Board for Biosecurity at the National Institutes of Health, a federal advisory committee that addresses issues related to biosecurity and dual use research at the request of the United States government.

Joe has received many awards for his contributions to the fields of infectious diseases and public health, including the Richard and Hinda Rosenthal Award from the American College of Physicians; the Gen-Probe Joseph Award from the American Society for Microbiology for exemplary leadership and service in the field of public health; and the Charles C. Shepard Lifetime Scientific Achievement Award from the CDC. Joe also received Professor of the Year at Emory University School of Public Health.

GREEN TERROR SPORTS HALL OF FAME

The Green Terror Sports Hall of Fame, sponsored by the McDaniel College Alumni Association, is designed to honor former athletes who have achieved prominence in their chosen fields and who also have made contributions to society. The Hall, with its charter induction in 1978, also recognizes other friends of McDaniel College who have contributed significantly to the athletic program. To submit a nomination, visit www.mcdaniel.edu/alumni/recognition.

The Green Terror Sports Hall of Fame Committee meets each spring to review the nominees for the awards. These awards are presented during Homecoming Weekend. An athlete must be separated from intercollegiate competition at the College for a minimum ten-year period for nomination. Any coach, staff, administrator or manager nominated may be inducted in that role immediately after retirement in that capacity.

2016 SPORTS HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

Ms. Kristy Costa '06 was one of the best two-sport athletes ever to compete for WMC/McDaniel, according to Cross Country Head Coach Doug Renner. She played a significant role in the women's basketball team's two Centennial Conference Championships in 2004 and 2005 and was on the team that made McDaniel's furthest run in the NCAA tournament which included a "Sweet 16" appearance. Her team also finished second in the Centennial Conference in 2006 when Kristy was the team captain. She ranks 2nd in career free throws with 318, 2nd in career free throw attempted with 451, 2nd in games played, 3rd in field goal percentage, 7th in offensive rebounds, 9th in field goals, 10th for scoring with 1268 points, and 10th with games started.

In women's outdoor track and field, Kristy was an individual champion in 2004 and 2005 in both the discus and heptathlon and was named Most Outstanding Performer both years. She still holds the program record for discus (40.48 meters), javelin (39.47 meters) and heptathlon (4,263 points). Her heptathlon score earned Kristy an NCAA provisional qualifying mark and established the Centennial Conference record at the time. She also still ranks 2nd all-time in the long jump, 7th in shot put, 8th in 4x400 relay and 9th in high jump.

Kristy is currently working as the Facility Coordinator of Campus Center Programs at Stockton University. She also works part-time as a production coordinator at Live Nation, and she has recently started her own event production company.

Mr. Josh Hanlon '04 helped lead the Green Terror lacrosse team to the Centennial Conference tournament in each of his four seasons from 2001-2004. Josh was a three-time 1st team All-Centennial Conference, two-time All-American, and two-time captain. He ranks 13th in games started, 22nd in games played and 23rd in ground balls. With Josh on defense, McDaniel was the ninth toughest team in the nation to score upon.

Following graduation from McDaniel, Josh began his career as a high school business teacher and started and coached the boys' varsity lacrosse program at Neshaminy High School in Langhorne, Pa. He was named Suburban One Conference Coach of the Year in 2007 and was inducted in the Lower Bucks Youth Lacrosse Hall of Fame for his commitment to advance lacrosse locally. In 2006, Josh formed and is the current owner of Arrowhead Lacrosse Inc., which is a service-based lacrosse company dedicated to helping players enhance their skills.

Josh continues to play in various men's lacrosse leagues and tournaments.

Mrs. Jacie Mathias-Jones '00, a Westminster native, was active in youth sports at a very young age. This was evident during her time playing for WMC. She was an All-Centennial Conference first team selection in 1997, 1999 and 2000. Jacie was also the Centennial Conference Player of the Year in 2000. She ranks 1st in career walks, 1st in most hits in a game, 3rd in most career runs batted in, 3rd in most walks in a season, 5th highest in season on base percentage, 6th highest in career on base percentage, 10th highest in season slugging percentage. She graduated as the 2nd all-time home run hitter in the program and conference history. She was also an excellent defensive player with speed and quickness. Coach George Dix names Jacie to his "All Time" WMC/McDaniel softball team. Jacie also played on the volleyball team in 1996.

Since graduating from WMC, Jacie has continued to play softball on many recreation leagues and has coached and mentored other athletes including the varsity softball team at Westminster High School. Jacie was inducted into the Carroll County Hall of Fame in 2013. She has also found her passion in the nonprofit world and is currently the program director at the Community Foundation of Carroll County. She has truly learned through sports how to be a team player and attributes much of her success to experiences playing sports in college and high school.

Mr. Broderick Maybank '06 was the College's first ever five-time All-American. He was an All-American in the long jump five times, including winning the 2004 National Championship. He was also an All-American in the triple jump in 2006. He won 10 Centennial Conference championships, including six times in the long jump, two times in the triple jump as well as the 100-meter dash, and the 4x100-meter relay. He was the Conference's Most Outstanding Field Performer two times and the Centennial Conference Offensive Player of the Year in football. He was the first running back to rush for 1,000 yards in a season and still has the fifth best rushing season in more than 100 years of football on the Hill. Broderick received the John A. Alexander Award and was even nicknamed McDaniel's Superman.

Broderick is currently working at Comcast Corporation as Supervisor of Network Maintenance. He plans to get his two young boys active in sports early doing whichever sport they choose.

Mr. Rex Walker '66, M.Ed. '69 played second base for the Green Terror baseball team. He earned first-team All-Middle Atlantic Conference honors in 1963. Rex finished his career with a .419 career batting average, which is still best in program history. He also has the highest career on-base percentage, hit eight home runs and successfully stole each base he attempted. Rex also played football as a half back, quarterback and defensive back. Rex received the John Alexander Award and baseball's Jim Boyer Award in 1965. He was part of three Mason Dixon champion baseball teams and two football teams. Rex's name is included on the Athletic Tribute Wall in Kenneth R. Gill Stadium.

After WMC, Rex served in the Army in Vietnam. Following his service, he went on to become a physical education teacher then an administrator. During that time Rex coached football and baseball for 30 years at a high school and was athletic director for 20 years.

Mr. Rolando Welch '94 was a two-time captain for the men's basketball team. A forward for the Green Terror, Rolando ranks 1st in career blocked shots, 1st in block shots per game, 1st in career offensive rebounds, 1st in season offensive rebounds, 1st in career defense rebounds, 1st in defensive rebound average, 1st in offensive rebounds, 2nd in total rebounds, 3rd in offensive rebound average per game, 2nd in game field goals attempted, 2nd in game free throws attempted, and 4th for season scoring. He ranks among McDaniel's Top 10 in career scoring. In 1992-1993, Rolando was a first team All-Middle Atlantic Conference selection and in 1993-1994 was a first team All-Centennial Conference honoree. He was awarded the John A. Alexander Medal Award in 1994.

One of Rolando's favorite memories playing at McDaniel is a game against Radford University where he caught a half-court pass from the point guard and then dunked it. Rolando still plays basketball recreationally and coaches both of his children's youth basketball teams. He has worked with at-risk youth at the Department of Juvenile Justice at the Alexandria Juvenile and Domestic Relations District Court for more than 20 years.
